

The city of Worcester will host the start of the final stage of the OVO Energy Tour of Britain on 10 September, as the race finishes outside London for the first time in five years.

Stage Eight of Britain's premier road cycling event on Sunday 10 September will start from Croft Road and continue through the centre of Worcester, heading on through Worcestershire to finish in Cardiff. The route through Worcestershire will include Pershore and Upton-upon-Severn, and cross the Malvern Hills at British Camp.

On Friday September 8, the Mayor of Worcester, Councillor Steve Mackay, will unveil the St John's Art and Heritage Trail.

The event will start at Cripplegate Park at 3.00pm.

An exciting art and heritage trail will be unveiled on Friday 8 September in St John's. Join us at 3pm in Cripplegate Park to unveil the first sculpture, followed by a walk through St John's discovering six plaques representing heritage through the ages, finishing at Pitmaston Park, the site of the final sculpture. Planet Art has developed the sculptures with funding from J Sainsbury plc and help from pupils at Pitmaston Primary School, Our Lady Queen of Peace Catholic Primary School, St Clement's C of E Primary School and Christopher Whitehead Language College.

Laslett Almshouse Chapel

Laslett's was described as an 'adornment' to the city. The Countess of Coventry was handed the key to unlock the main gate and declare the Almshouses duly open.



Worcester Cathedral

Visitors to Worcester Cathedral can enjoy free activities. Inside, it is airy and open with box pews, a gallery and an attractive arched ceiling. The carved three-decker pulpit, topped by a gilded pelican feeding her young, is a work of art, and the 1795 organ by the Gray Brothers of London is Grade I listed. The tall Tudor tower remains from the old church.
